Brothers Robert and Ricky were happy to have the opportunity of meeting with members of the Hong Kong Lasallian Education Council on the 11th of December. Brother Robert was well aware of and sympathized with the desire to have more Brothers in Hong Kong. However, he emphasized that the only long-term solution was the promotion of local vocations. On another question, it remains to be seen if and when mainland China will further open up its educational sector to allow for Lasallian expansion there. Brother Robert thanked the members and encouraged the Council Members to continue playing an active role in the future.

Gathering with the Lasallian Volunteers and Youth Movement Members

Brothers Robert and Ricky had a gathering with the members of the Lasallian Volunteers and the Lasallian Youth Movement on the 12th of December. Brother Jeffrey Chan and some teacher-helpers

also attended. The young members of the Hong Kong Lasallian Family shared with the Superior difficulties thev the encountered as well as the lessons they learned in the process of serving others. Brother Robert in turn told them about the story of our Founder and how he led the growth of the Institute in the midst of difficulties. Those who attended were pleased with the recognition and encouragement given to them.

A Lasallian Mission in a Forgotten Land

The Story of the First Foundation of De La Salle Brothers in China 1936-1948

Introduction:

"We came up that far and we will continue to China."

In October, 1940, five Brothers from Montreal were sent to China. They were met in Yokohama by Brother Marcel Petit, who was serving in Japan at the time. Brother Marcel told them that a war was likely to start shortly and that it would be safer for them to sail back to Canada. Instead of heeding the warning, the Brothers decided to march on to China.

Letter from Brother Marie-Liguori (Director of the Community in Moukden) to Brother Assistant Romuald Hosea

13th November 1939

Dear Brother Assistant,

Since March his Excellency Mgr Blois has added another priest to the staff of the seminary. I discreetly asked his Excellency if he required the services of another Brother, and he assured me that he did not.

We work flat out at the seminary, putting all we have got into the work. It is not our project, but we give ourselves fully to it as if it were. After all we are labouring for the Lord and for His Church. There is great merit in what we are doing, we work away in all humility, leaving to others the glory of our achievements.

During the last holidays some of us were not well, though normally we enjoy good health for the most part, except for Brother Barthelemy who is not so strong and he frequently suffers from gastric problems.

Times are becoming difficult now for us. Coal, flour and rice are no longer freely available, they have become rationed items. The community has stocked up some supplies, we feel this is prudent. The Father Procurator has informed us that there will be an increase in salary. The matter has been decided in principle, but I still do not know by how much.

Brothers' residence in Moukden Letters from Rome reach us, as did your latest, via Siberia. It is not the same with America. Canadian shipping in the Pacific is quite irregular.

Recently the Education Department in the capital Hsinking 盛京 voted a budget to establish 500 middle schools over the next four years, perhaps by the end of 1943.

We sincerely hope in the course of 1940 that you will be able to send us three new Brothers here to Moukden. For the first two years these Brothers should study Manchurian and if possible at least one among them should study Japanese. I also believe good relations with them will be a major factor when it comes to establish a new work ...

Here is a project for your consideration which we have been reflecting on for some time. We happen to know and in fact have the most cordial relations with a group of local Brothers with a rule very similar to ours, founded by Belgian Bishop Mgr Janssens. They are currently working in Jehol 熱河, which is a neighbouring province. The congregation has 36 professed members and they run a middle school as well as a number of elementary schools. I knew their superior in Tokyo, we followed the same Japanese classes. Every time they come to Moukden they never fail to come by to visit us.

Here is our proposition: I believe Mgr Janssens would give us two Brothers for a period of two years who would teach Chinese to those Brothers you would like to send us. These local Brothers would actually live with the new missionaries, manage a common routine, and have recreation together. This would allow for immersion in the language. This is obviously very desirable. One could not do any better with lay (language) teachers. There are some very competent people among these local Brothers. The superior is a graduate from Peking University. Another speaks excellent French. How do you feel about this plan?

It seems there is a move among some of these local Brothers for a merger with our Congregation. The superior has given us some hints of this. Right now it has not been easy to see our way, and it may be best to wait for a while.

All three of us feel that a language school — not on the same grand scale as at Sendai — but one offering just French and English, would have a good chance of success. Such a school already exists for girls. We are sure that boys would join such courses in even greater numbers. This project would help to make us better known among the people, and once they get a little more acquainted with us, we will win hearts. That means everything when dealing with the Japanese. We are not thinking of big things, we just want to do God's will. It is pointless, as you said in a previous letter, to start 'building castles in Spain'. We need to consider carefully the available resources, finances and personnel of the Montreal District and decide accordingly.

In 1940, a house was bought in Moukden called Saint Francis Xavier for the Brothers studying the language. On the 19th of October, Brother Marie-Marcel, Brother Marie-Mederic, Brother Jules, Brother Odilo, Brother Hippolyte and Brother Guy arrived in China.

Soon a house was bought in Kirin and five Brothers were appointed to run a seminary school called 'Seminaire St. Joseph's' there. The Brothers were Barthelemy (Director), Marcel, Guy, Jules, Hippolyte and Odilo.

Unfortunately, less than two months later, on the 8th of December, 1940, they were informed by a Japanese officer, a former student of the Marianists who treated them with respect, that they were going to be interned and were not allowed to leave town.

Postscript: The Congregation mentioned in Brother Liguori's letter is called 'The Society of the Disciples of the Sacred Heart of Jesus'. Its founder Mgr Janssens had chosen St. John Baptist de La Salle as the principal Patron of the Society. One of the local Brothers from Jehol, Brother Paul Sun, fled to Hong Kong in 1949. Brother Paul, Superior General of the Society, lived with the Brothers in La Salle College and he helped in teaching in La Salle Primary. He sought at first to integrate with the De La Sale Brothers and for this purpose, he spent two years at the Brother's Novitiate in England. However, he was advised by the Pope to retain his post of Superior General as well as the separate identity of his congregation while working in close association with the De La Salle Brothers in Hong Kong. With the help of the Brothers, he established St. Joseph's Anglo-Chinese School, which has flourished into a popular school in the eastern part of Kowloon. Brother Paul was affiliated to the Institute of the De La Salle Brothers in 1972.
