Welcome



May the Year of the Rat bring peace and joy to all our readers.




100 to the good

As far as we are aware, Mr. Sonny Sales is the oldest Lasallian alumnus in Hong Kong. He was a student in the very first year of the opening of La Salle College in 1932. On the 13th January 2020, he celebrated his 100th Birthday in the presence of his sister Amelia, doctors, nurses, office staff and old friends. Although Sonny is immobile and cannot speak, he seemed unusually alert and the doctors assured us he was following the proceedings. This was especially the case when we sang the school song. For so many years, Sonny was brimful of energy in the service of the people of Hong Kong, in such positions as Chair of the Urban Council and of the Sports Federation and Olympic Committee of Hong Kong. We were delighted to see him on his 100th and told him we would be back for 101!



The Honourable Arnaldo de Oliverira Sales was born in 1920 in Shameen-Canton, now named Guangzhou. Although he enjoyed a pleasant childhood, China was at the time immersed in civil war, prompting his family to move to Hong Kong during his teenage years. He first studied in St. Joseph's College Branch School on Chatham Road and became one of the first batch of students to attend La Salle College in 1932. During the Japanese occupation of Hong Kong in World War II, Mr. Sales moved to Macau. After the War, he decided to settle down in Hong Kong with his family.



La Salle College in the 30s

Mr. Sales became a leader in the civic, cultural and sporting life of Hong Kong. In sports, we find him as President of the Sports Federation & Olympic Committee of Hong Kong, frequently leading the Hong Kong Delegations to participate in various international multi-sports events. In 1972, as Chef de Mission of the Hong Kong Delegation to the Munich Olympic Games, he successfully negotiated with guerrillas for the release of Hong Kong Delegation members in what became known as the “Munich Massacre” incident. South China Morning Post reported:

‘The president of the Hong Kong Amateur Federation and Olympic Committee, A. de O. Sales, confronted the terrorists and convinced them that Hong Kong had “nothing to do with all of this”, ultimately ensuring they were released unharmed. Sales told the *Post*: “I was not staying at the athletes’ village. But when I heard about the crisis, I rushed there to find two Hong Kong officials were still inside the building. Hong Kong was staying on the floor above the Israeli team. I wanted to go in and get them out, but the German police did not want me to go in. While my deputy Ramon Young engaged the police in conversation, I slipped past and walked across into the building. I came face to face with the leader of Black September. He must have wondered who I was as I was not wearing a Hong Kong blazer. I identified myself and told him that I had come to get some Hong Kong people who were still inside.’




Mr. Sales with Hong Kong first Olympic gold medalist, windsurfer Lee Lai Shan in 1996

His contribution to Hong Kong's aquatic development was so great that FINA awarded the "Highest Merit" in 1978 to Hong Kong in honour of his achievement in constructing the greatest number of swimming pools in any city 1977.

In the civic and cultural world, we see Mr. Sales as chairman of the Urban Council of Hong Kong and chairman of the Hong Kong Housing Authority. In addition, we see him organising the first Festival of Asian Arts in 1976 and the first Hong Kong International Film Festival in 1977. He was also instrumental in setting up the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra and the Hong Kong Repertory Theatre.

In our Lasallian world, Mr. Sales served as President of the La Salle College Old Boys' Association from 1957 to 1960. He supported close liaison with the International Confederation of Past Presidents of the Christian Brothers schools and was elected to the Confederation Council, a signal honour for the Lasallian Family in Hong Kong.

Currently, we are celebrating the 10th anniversary of Sonny being made an Affiliated Member of the De La Salle Brothers in March 2010 by the Superior General of the Brothers of the Christian Schools. This honour is another testimony to Sonny's loyalty and service to the Lasallian Family. Throughout his life he has been a staunch Lasallian, taking an active and constructive part in various functions and activities. Even in his advanced years he continues to attend Lasallian events and can always be relied upon in time of need.



In October 2011, the World Union of Lasallian Former Students (UMAEL) bestowed a singular honour on five outstanding Lasallian alumni in the world. This is the first time UMAEL has given such an award. One of the recipients of this UMAEL Outstanding Global Lasallian Award went to Mr. Sales.

It is not surprising to hear that Mr. Sales placed a high regard on education. This is what he has to say:

“Life is an unending process of education. You can never say I have learned enough. Everybody has something to teach to others, something which will be helpful.”

The Hong Kong Outstanding Students Award



The 34-year-old Hong Kong Outstanding Students Award organized by YouthArch Foundation is one of the most prestigious awards for secondary school students in Hong Kong. With more than 30 years of history, the Award has garnered widespread recognition and support from the community. This year, the judges selected 11 students out of 368 candidates through a written test, an assessment camp, an

enrichment programme, sharing sessions and the final interview. A Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College student, Lau Yu Ka, Larry, was one of the 11 winners. His schoolmate Chan Man Ho also got the finalist award for being one of the top 40 students.

St. Joseph's College

The 145th Anniversary Opening Ceremony of the College was held on 10th January 2020 in the school hall. The Guest of Honour was Mr. David Lee Kwok Po, chairman of the St. Joseph's College Foundation. The school Principal, Mr. Perrick Ching, availed of the opportunity to inform participants of the projected future development of the College.



Home of Love



The Home of Love was set up in 1983 by Mother Teresa's Missionary Sisters of Charity. They have been operating in Sham Shui Po, one of the more disadvantaged districts in Hong Kong, serving the homeless and desolate in this area. Meals are served each day to between 60 and 100 persons. The meals usually consist of rice, some meat and vegetable, a soft drink and a fruit. After saying a prayer, those who possess meal cards issued by the Social Welfare Department are served first. Other needy people who show up will then receive food if available. Volunteers, some from our Lasallian schools, go to help especially at the weekends when classes are held for the needy children of the neighbourhood. This service is much appreciated by the Sisters.

Outstanding Young People Award

The Outstanding Young People Award is a yearly ceremony in Hong Kong. Out of the eight awardees in 2019, two were old boys of La Salle College.




Professor Jason Yam (Class of 1998) is now the Associate Director, Department of Ophthalmology & Visual Sciences, Faculty of Medicine, Chinese University of Hong Kong. In Hong Kong, the disparity between the rich and the poor is big. The eye health of poor children is often neglected. As such, Professor Yam and his team initiated the most extensive service scheme in Hong Kong to teach children across Hong Kong to protect their eyes by enhancing public awareness,

building volunteer platforms, and connecting different social sectors. In the past five years, they have provided a service for more than 20,000 grass-root families, and organized more than 170 public educational talks. In total, they reached over 30,000 parents and 2,000 teachers and social workers.

Mr. Arnold Chan (Class of 2005) gave up his lucrative job in investment banking and turned to education for the underprivileged. The only reason for him to step out from his comfort zone is that he wants to give back to society by helping the underprivileged school children with the strong belief that “education changes destiny.” Arnold teamed up with a group of enthusiastic and passionate young leaders to set up Teach4HK, following the model of Teach for America. Teach4HK offers a 1-year fellowship programme to university graduates who will serve full-time in schools. While the children will directly benefit, Arnold hopes that a greater impact can be attained when the fellow teachers, with experience in teaching, will take education into account to make a difference in whatever their future career will be. At present, 36 local schools are in this programme.



Congratulations to Jason and Arnold who clearly show the Lasallian spirit of service. The College wishes them every success in their future endeavours.
